Among the goals Governor Joe has identified for his team this year are two that compliment each other and offer a new opportunity for outreach onto our communities.

Lions ALERT Program



The first is the Lions ALERT program. The program was kicked off at the International level by then IP Al Brandel who signed a MOU with the International Foundation of Red Cross to "join forces in order to strengthen the essential role volunteers play in preparing for disasters and in responding to emergencies at the emergency level."

Our District has experienced its share of disasters, and in thinking back to the recent wildfires, we did a great job at providing support where it was most needed. The ALERT program offers us an opportunity to be even better prepared and to work in partnership with other emergency responders in our communities.

LCI has been very proactive in creating the program. Posted on the website are a variety of documents from the ALERT guide to checklists for "How to Develop a Lions ALERT Plan", "Disaster Relief Opportunities", "Personal Safety" and "After A Disaster Occurs". Also included is a ready made flyer for the program as well as a power point program to use for education about the program.

Governor Joe has asked me to oversee the creation of an ALERT Plan for our District, and I will be working with the Region & Zone Chairs to make that happen. My goal is to have the plan done at least in draft form by the November cabinet meeting. While I will be working with the RC's & ZC's, they will be looking for Lions in each club to provide the community level contact that allows Lions to be so effective in disaster response.

RC's & ZC's - I will be in touch with each of you electronically in August to begin this process. Club Presidents and officers; please begin thinking about members of your club that would be interested in helping in the formation of our plan. I believe this is

a great win-win, as we will be putting in place a plan that allows for an immediate and organized response to a local emergency, AND this process will provide a new vehicle for outreach and service to our communities.....and perhaps even some new Lions !

Thanks in advance for your help as we create District 4-C6's ALERT Plan.

Lions Eye Foundation Cabinet Meeting Report by 2nd VDG Liz Crooke

The Annual Meeting of the California – Nevada Lions Eye Foundation was held July 19, 2009 at the California Pacific Medical Center in San Francisco.

This meeting was well attended by Lions of District 4-C6, almost all of whom are Advisors or Trustees in the Foundation.

The Lions Eye Foundation will turn 50 years old next year, and a celebration is being planned for September 10 & 11, 2010 in San Francisco. Mark your calendars now as this promises to be a memorable event as we come together to recognize 50 years of providing free eye care and surgery to the uninsured.

This last quarter has been the busiest in the clinics history bringing in more patients than any other quarter in the history of the organization. The high-

est number of referrals previous to this one was 56, this last quarter resulted in 89 referrals from Lions Clubs.

Statistics from our district show that there were 10 referrals resulting in 4 surgeries. The patients ranged in age from 7 to 81 years. Total surgeries for the quarter for all referred patients resulted in \$862,000.00 worth of care provided by California Pacific Medical Center at no cost to the patients.

But I also want to share with you the "value added" part of this partnership between the California Pacific Medical Center and the Lions of California and Nevada. Because of the number of referrals that Lions provide, more surgeries are needed to serve those patients.

Because more surgeries are

needed, more residents are needed to perform those surgeries.

C.P.M.C. has 9 residents and 4 fellows on staff. Because CPMC is a teaching hospital, the additional surgeries that our referred patients require result in more teaching opportunities for the residents. We learned last weekend that CPMC is recognized as being in the top 1% of fewer than 20% of similar schools nationwide whose residents pass their written and oral tests on the first try. club to become a stronger, more viable partner in their communities. AND..... 100% of the residents from CPMC have passed those tests on the first try for the past 8 years.

Dr Day said it best when she said. "Lions make the clinic hum, and the tune is a good one".

Meet our International President, Eberhard Wirfs

2009-2010 International President Encourages Lions to “Move to Grow”



Every Lion has a story to tell. Eberhard Wirfs could write a book. As a 17-year-old in Germany, he met Elvis, the most famous GI in the world at the time at a Gasthaus (a tavern/restaurant). When Elvis picked up a guitar to strum a soft German folk song, Wirfs accompanied him on piano. “One day I’ll sing a song from Germany for the world,” Elvis assured Wirfs. The King made good on his promise by singing Wooden Heart, based on a German folksong, in the 1961 film G.I. Blues.

“There are many things you can’t do with money. You need manpower. That’s what we have,” says Wirfs. “We are really good at getting results.”

An Historical Presidency

Wirfs is making history in another way as the first German president of Lions Clubs International.

As a young man, after an internship at a U.S. food company that was years ahead of its overseas counterparts in marketing – and only a few miles from Oak Brook – Wirfs took over his father’s small food company in Germany and pioneered a food industry segment in Europe. “We transferred the frozen food concept to Europe and you will find our company wherever people like to eat well out of the home such as at restaurants, airplanes and railway stations,” he proudly explains.

The Frankfurt area-native – who learned English in school because he wanted to travel and meet people from other cultures – now leads the service association that prides itself on its international character and worldwide appeal.

Our new president relishes his membership because hands-on service stirs his soul. “As a Lion you are asked for help. As a Lion you are needed. If somebody is needed, he is able to contribute,” he says. “This enriches our life. Sometimes with only a little money, but much more with your hands, you give the help that is needed. It’s not only satisfying, it’s important. It’s important as a citizen to have this kind of responsibility in the world.”

Early Hardship

A Lions pin was the linchpin for Wirfs’ becoming a Lion. In 1985, he met with a friend. “And he always wears his pin. And one day I ask him what is this? I did not know,” recounts Wirfs. The friend invited him to the Hofheim AM Taunus Lions Club and Wirfs soon was wearing his own pin.

Wirfs’ club took a special interest in those with multiple sclerosis. Lions provided a van for them and treated them to a daylong boat trip on the shimmering Rhein River. “It was like Christmas for them. They were so happy to be out on a beautiful day,” recalls Wirfs. Being around those with a disability deepened his appreciation for the tenacity of the human spirit.

Wirfs was born in 1942. His father was a medical officer. Evacuating Frankfurt during the war, Wirfs’ mother took her three young children to a farm. “It was a very bad time – hungry and just barely able to get by,” he says. “My mother was alone, with her three children. She worked very hard just to get her kids out of hunger.”

In his travels today, Wirfs can’t bear to pass by hungry children. “If Eberhard has no food or drink to give him, he maybe touches his hand. We heard it’s not a good idea to give a child money. It’s better to give him love,” says Margit, his wife.

A Lions Leader

As a Lion, Wirfs was a quick learner. In a short span, he progressed to become a Lions leader in Germany and then worldwide. He served as club president, zone and region chairperson, district governor and council chairperson before being elected in 2002 in Osaka, Japan, for a two-year term as an international director.

One of Wirfs’ major achievements was helping implement Lions Quest in Germany. “It’s an anti-drug program,” says Wirfs. “It’s also a program to learn to say no. To say no to drugs. To say no to bad behavior. To say no to nega-

tive influence. And Lions Quest is to be seen from my point of view as a core program of Lions Clubs International in the future.”

Move to Grow

The overarching theme of Wirfs’ presidency will be “move to grow.” Lions need momentum, or movement, to grow and progress. Nothing that remains motionless moves forward. Progress grows from purposeful movement.

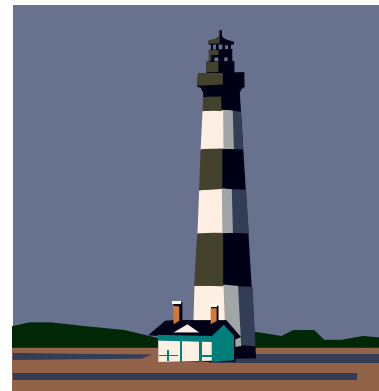

Lara Tromba from Santa Cruz, CA USA to Austria 2009

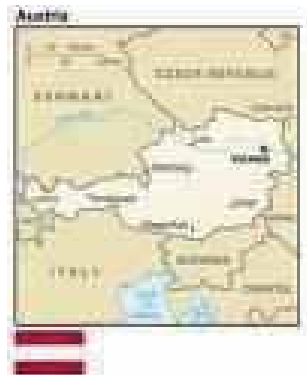
